1. Patient Assessment

Patient assessment is the first step in the nursing process and a vital skill for nurses. It allows nurses to create a baseline for a client's health, track their progress and develop an overall understanding of their needs.

During the physical examination, nurses look for objective data such as blood pressure, temperature and heart rate as well as subjective information like pain levels, numbness or nausea. They also assess the patient's mental state and level of distress.

A thorough patient assessment can help a nurse prioritize care and determine whether the client requires immediate transport to a specialist facility. In fact, studies have shown that patients treated at specialized centers receive better outcomes than those who are not.
